

Cheri Beyer

Graduating from Frazee in 1984 with a 4.0 GPA and as Valedictorian of her class, Cheri Beyer also competed as a four-sport athlete (volleyball, basketball, golf, and track). In volleyball, Cheri earned three letters, was the team MVP for two years, and was All-Conference for two years. During the spring, she lettered two years in golf, making All-Conference one of those years. In track, she lettered three times. As an eighth grader, Cheri played Varsity in basketball, eventually leading her to five letters in the sport. She was denoted as the Conference MVP, Team Captain, and Team MVP for three years consecutively. In addition, she was a four-time HOL All-Conference recipient and lead her 1983 team to a District 23 championship. She set a school record for free throw percentage at 82%, a single season record of 478 points, and an overall record of 1504 points before the three-point shot was adopted. Over the course of four years, she averaged 20.2 points per game and had a career field goal percentage of 44%. After high school, Cheri played basketball for four years at Concordia College in Moorhead where she was part of the 1988 National Championship team. She received her BA in Math Education, Physical Education, and Coaching that same year and graduated with Honors. She now teaches algebra and geometry in Stewartville, MN where she has been a head coach for both volleyball and basketball as well as an assistant coach in golf and softball.

Woody Blasing

Woody Blasing taught in Frazee for 34 years and coached various sports for 28 years. For 20 years, Woody lead the girls' basketball team, obtaining 200+ wins. For six years, his team acquired a spot in the District 23 "Final Four." In 1985, his team earned the honor of District 23 Runner-Up, while in 1983, they clenched the championship title. He was named HOL Coach of the Year three times and District Coach of the Year two years. Two of his players moved onto the collegiate level where they played on National Championship Teams at Concordia College. Beyond the basketball court, Woody also coached Junior High football for five years, was the Football Varsity Assistant for six years, coached JV boys' basketball for two years and elementary basketball as well. During his time with the Frazee-Vergas School District, he was instrumental in developing the school forest, served on the State Environmental Education Curriculum Advisory Board, and chaired the establishment of science curriculum. All his efforts were acknowledged when he procured the title of Teacher of the Year in 1996 and was a finalist for the Minnesota Teacher of the Year.
